Notice of Decision - Consummation of Abandonment

To Whom It May Concern,

The State of New Hampshire, filed a Notice of Consummation dated 10/24/2019, pursuant to a Decision of the Surface Transportation Board to fully abandon a segment of the former Boston & Maine Railroad in the towns of Littleton and Bethlehem, New Hampshire. The Department of Transportation will commence salvage activities on this segment of the rail line and coordinate ways the Bureau of Trails.

The Surface Transportation Board's Office of Environmental Analysis has observed that endangered species are not likely to be impacted by the anticipated salvage operation as the salvage operation will be limited to the removal of rail and other track materials, no bridges, culvert or support masonry will be disturbed and there will be no excavation or earthwork within the scope of work for the proposed salvage operation. Additionally the Ammonusuc River and its tributaries should not be affected as work within the railroad corridor is limited to the track alignment. However, per the Surface Transportation Board's Decision on Abandonment, if any federally listed threatened or endangered species are encountered during the abandonment-related salvage activities, then all such work must be immediately halted and the United States

Fish and Wildlife Service shall be consulted for mitigation processes for the specific threat. For your reference, enclosed is a list of endangered and threatened species in NH.
